



Richard D. Lapo

June 6, 1932 - March 29, 2018

Richard D. Lapo was born in Ithaca New York to Cecil and Beatrice Lapo. His family which included his sister Carol (Carol Lapo Smith) also lived in Cuyahoga Falls Ohio and Wichita Falls Texas. Richard graduated from Wichita Falls High School and trekked to Westminster Choir College in Princeton New Jersey. Following in their father Cecil's footsteps, both Richard and Carol graduated from Westminster Choir College. After he received his BA in Music, "Dick" completed his Master's degree also at Princeton in 1955. Westminster continued to be a lifelong theme and inspiration in his work and accomplishments.

While attending college, one of his favorite summer jobs was working at Yellowstone National Park where he hauled garbage by day and led sing-a-longs and nightly entertainment for the tourists in the Old Faithful Lodge by night. This added a note of hilarity to his classical training that was woven into his life.

After graduating he was immediately recruited to Catalina United Methodist Church as the minister of music where he grew a multigenerational choir system of 11 choirs and 500 choristers. He also met a lovely young soprano in his adult choir, named Nancy. They made their life together for the next 61 years. They had two children Debra Lapo and Robert Lapo while living in Tucson. He also continued music ministry at churches in Florida and Phoenix until Dr. William E. Steward, also an alumnus of Westminster Choir College, recruited him to music faculty at Wenatchee Valley College.

He and Nancy packed up the family and arrived in Wenatchee hauling a U-Haul trailer on a dismal grey snowless winter day in January 1967. While Richard enjoyed his multiple roles as choral conductor, instructor of voice, music theory, music appreciation etc. at WVC, Nancy taught for Head Start. It was through this program that William (Andersen) Lapo became known to our family and was adopted into it.

It takes pages to write all of Richard's accomplishments, productions and performances in his years at Wenatchee College 1967-1994 and following into retirement. Highlights included performing the lead roles of Curly ("Oklahoma"-1969), Fagin ("Oliver"- 1971) and, his favorite of all time, Tevye ("Fiddler on the Roof" -1973 and 1988) with Wenatchee Music Theatre. He started a community chorus which later became Columbia Chorale, conducted the YMCA Boys' Choir, and, together with Keith Sexson produced and directed

numerous WVC musicals including several productions of Menotti's "Amahl and The Night Visitors". In 2004 he was awarded the Stanley Lifetime Achievement Award and had previously been named Instructor of the year at Wenatchee Valley College in 1985. He retired from Wenatchee Valley College in 1994 and even then continued his life in music serving as NW Liaison for the Community Concert Association along with his wife Nancy. Throughout his career of teaching, conducting and performing, his wife Nancy was by his side: He was the front man and she was his supporter and steadfast partner. Taking his final bow, Richard Lapo passed away, his family and wife Nancy at his bedside. He lived a rich and wonderful life. Well Done. Bravo!

I had started singing at a very young age but thru my High School years never had the chance to use my soprano voice. When I applied for a Morris Merit Scholarship Dick had the vision that, although I had spent 3yrs in high school as an Alto, I needed to develop my soprano voice. Thru his mentoring I attained the Morris Merit Scholarship and was able to complete my 2 yrs of music studies at WVC. Of course part of the stipulations of the scholarship included performing, writing music & music theory. I will always remember his encouragement, support and guidance. “ So sorry to hear about Dick's passing. He gave so much to Wenatchee Valley College and the community over the years. I personally owe him a big debt of gratitude. Over 45 years ago, when I was still a teenager, I wanted desperately to attend college. On the first day of registration I went to WVC with all the money I could spare--- only \$76. As it turned out, Dick just happened to be my advisor. I told him I wanted to take as many classes as I could with \$76, which meant I could only afford maybe two classes. I told him how desperately I wanted to take a full load, but, alas, a full load at the time was \$86 dollars and I could barely afford food and rent, despite working full time. Without any hesitation, Dick pulled \$10 out of his pocket and said, "Now you can take a full load". Then he asked me if I liked to sing. I told him that I loved to sing. He then told me that if I enrolled in choir classes and voice lessons that he could help me get music scholarships in the future. Needless to say, I was ecstatic and so very thankful! Because of his act of kindness and his help, I was able to stay in college and graduated with my nursing degree three years later. At the time, Dick was also directing a community choir on an intermittent basis. He inspired me to go on to establish the Columbia Chorale (with Patsy Ford) which he directed for several years and that is still performing today. I honestly don't know what would have become of me if it weren't for Dick for helping me out during that very vulnerable time in my life. I will never forget him.----Chris Jeffris
