



## Cecil Roscoe Hanna

April 26, 1918 - October 20, 2010

Cecil Roscoe Hanna, 92 passed away on Wednesday, October 20, 2010 in Wenatchee. He was born April 26, 1918 to John Thomas Hanna and Maude Blankenship Hanna in Saltilo, Tennessee. His mother died when he was 3 and the mother who raised him was the lovely Beulah Oldham Hanna. His father married the local schoolteacher.

After High School he traveled, hitch hiking and exploring the West. He attended the University of Tennessee and in his second year left to join the Army Air Corps during World War II. He worked the Medical laboratory on base in Pocatello, Idaho where he met the love of his life, Jeanne Garrett at the USO. He always laughingly claimed to have "won the war but lost the battle of Pocatello". They were married in November 1944. Inseparable lovebirds they were, Whenever you saw one you also saw the other.

They made their home in Blackfoot for 21 years. He worked as a partsman for the Ford Garage, 20th Century Motors, then worked for a few years for the Atomic Energy Commission and finally with American Potato Company in the laboratory.

In 1965 they moved to Moses Lake, Washington where he became the manager of the laboratory at the American Potato Company. He was a Mason and enjoyed his years with the lodge and with Jeanne in Eastern Star where

they enjoyed being Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron in the Silver Sage Chapter. He joined the Shrine, el Katif in Spokane.

They made their final home in Wenatchee after he retired. He loved his work with church and with RSVP and the fun trips with Shirley Shelton Tours. He loved God and his Bible through lectures and study groups. He was in demand as a speaker for many years.

He is survived by his daughter, Pat (Don) Koehler of Wenatchee; his granddaughters, Cindy (Bob) Clark of Eugene, Oregon, and Valerie Koehler (Jon Oleyar) of Suquamish, Washington. Also great granddaughter, Morgan Giese of Eugene, Oregon and great grandsons Nicholas and Benjamin Oleyar of Suquamish, Washington.
