Harriett Field Beaulieu, 99, passed away Thursday March 8, 2012 in East Wenatchee, Washington.

She was born on January 2, 1913 in Seattle, Washington to Robert and Frances Field, valley pioneers.

She grew up in Leavenworth where she received her early education and graduated from Leavenworth High School. She then attended the University of Washington where she was a member of Kappa Alpha Sorority.

She was an avid gardener and a lover of a competitive game of bridge.

Mrs. Beaulieu married Charles B. Beaulieu on March 2, 1935 in Everett, Washington. They lived in Seattle, WA and Manila Philippines prior to coming to Wenatchee in 1952. The couple moved to East Wenatchee in 1985. Harriet also lived in Los Angeles for 3 ½ years while Chuck served with the armed services in the Pacific.

Mrs. Beaulieu was a member of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, The Wenatchee Golf and Country Club, and a past member of the Wenatchee Hospital Guild, The Little Art Gallery, and Women of Rotary.

Survivors include: her daughter, Sue Dorn of East Wenatchee, WA; Grandchildren, Robert Dorn and Dr. Mary T. Bowden.

Harriett Beaulieu was preceded in death by her daughter, Judy in 1955, and her husband in 1993.
