James (Jim) E. Fletcher, Monitor passed away August 4th, 2024 in Cashmere Washington at the age of 84.

Jim was born to Elton and Lois (Carpenter) Fletcher on July 4, 1940. Jim grew up in Monitor, graduating from Cashmere High School in 1958. Jim went on to get both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Brigham Young University.

Jim's choice of social work as a profession reflected the values that guided his life. He retired from the Department of Social and Health Services with the State of Washington after after 40 years of service. He showed compassion, kindness, and generosity to those around him in both professional and personal situations. Jim often used these values to help others quietly, never seeking recognition for his acts. He made a difference in people's lives, and the world was a better place because of his presence.

Jim's intelligence led to a lifelong love of learning. His books were a source of wonder and wisdom to him. Someone once said that Jim could talk to anyone about anything often with a wicked sense of humor. His sister in law, Geri Fletcher once said that Jim could have been a stand up comedian.

Jim had some interesting experiences as he traveled through his lifetime. Jim was a very young boy when he decided that he could be just like Superman. Jim was proving this when he decided to fly off the roof, resulting in a broken arm.

Another notable experience was when he agreed to have his photo used in the state flyer system to recognize him as one of the state's longest social workers and to be used to recruit future social workers. Little did he know that his photo would later be featured on a billboard on busy Aurora Avenue in Seattle, Washington, for all to see.

Jim had many interests during his life. He was an avid genealogist, often making hilarious comments about the black sheep of his family. However, he was very proud of his ancestry, especially those ancestors who helped others.

Jim, in the tradition of his parents, also helped those in need, including many four legged creatures.

Jim's love will continue in the hearts of his family, his good friends and the many people who experienced his help and generosity. Jim's advice to all of us would be to "be kind and helpful to the person or creature next to you".

Jim is survived by his sister Marcia (Bob), Jacksonville, Florida; his sister in law Geri Fletcher, Santa Maria, California; niece Tracy Fletcher, Concord, California; Nephews Craig(Erika) Drain, Oregon; Tim (Sue) Fletcher, Tieton, Wa; and Brian(Julie) Wilson, Jacksonville Florida; Great Nieces, Grace Wilson, Missoula Montana, Tara Wilson, Jacksonville Florida and Alyssa(Alex) Gray, Jacksonville Florida.

Jim is survived by close friends who, over the years, became like family, as well as by all the lives he touched with his unwavering generosity.

Jim was preceded in death by his beloved parents and brother Donald E. Fletcher, who he now joins in eternal rest. Their guiding love and faith shaped his life, and he is at peace, reunited with them.

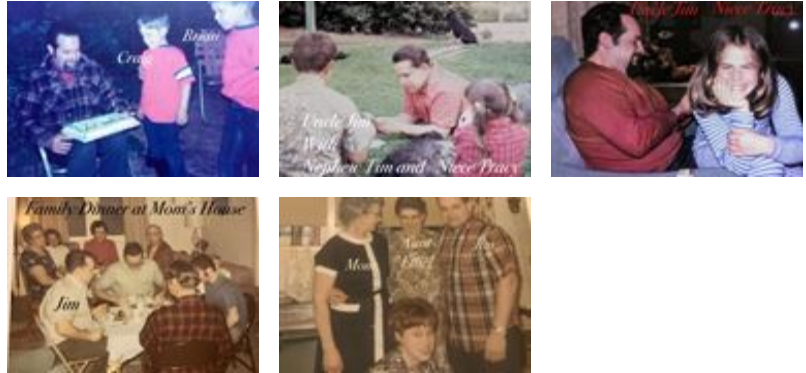

Jim and I were at a time very good friends. He was a coworker at the Department of Public Assistance who was the first person I really got to know. I had, it turned out, rented an old house not far from a brick upstairs apartment he resided in a short walk away. Jim was very well read, an intellectual with eclectic tastes, and a terrific sense of humor. I met his mother too, during my one year stay in Wenatchee, a very nice person and knowledgeable about local history. Jim's grandfather, I was told, made a living hauling goods to Wenatchee by Colockum Pass, a very challenging route, around the turn of the Twentieth Century. Jim and I once travelled to the Okanogan Reservation, I had a chance to do some unexpectedly wild horse riding, about which we laughed later. We shared an adventure traveling to the Santa Cruz California area about 1970, staying with his friends in a mountain cabin, and engaging in local sightseeing. Jim had a very wry sense of humor which probably passed over some peoples heads, while others would find him hilarious. About a dozen years ago I tracked him down, on a trip north from Las Vegas NV where we lived at the time. My wife and I had lunch with him at a restaurant on Wenatchee Avenue, about a dozen years ago. We recalled old times, and I regretted it had been so long since I had seen him last.

From the Music of India, to Paul Simon singing "Kodachrome", Jim's music interest seemed to have no bounds, he could be a fascinating guru or a very ordinary guy, depending on the audience. There was a sense of mystery about him, that didn't readily reveal itself. More than anything else, he was a true friend whom I will never forget, It saddens me to learn of his passing.
