



## Marjorie Roy

October 27, 1927 - February 10, 2019

Marj Roy, 91, died on Sunday, February 10, 2019 in Wenatchee, WA. She was surrounded by loved ones in her final days and went peacefully to the hands of God. Marjorie Marie was born in Paxton, IL on October 27, 1927 to Percy H. and Anna M. (Johnson) Crowe and attended Paxton High School. On January 14, 1944, Marjorie Crowe married Homer Roy in Vancouver, WA, where the couple had relocated the previous year.

The Roy's first child was born in Vancouver, WA, with six more born in Wenatchee, WA to complete their family following their move in 1946. Marj lived in her home for 58 years, 41 of those as a widow—though she often opened her home to family and friends in need to provide room and board. When Homer died in 1978, she started a daycare business in her home which she operated until she retired in December 1992. Marj lovingly cared for dozens of children including several of her grandchildren. She became “Gram” to many local children who stayed in touch with her through the years.

Marj's love of children was a thread that continued throughout her life. Besides being a young mother of seven children, she held a job providing childcare at the Columbia Lanes. For more than 20 years, she led shoebox gift collection efforts at Eastmont Community Church for Operation Christmas Child. She personally contributed 10 gift boxes for third world children each holiday season through the end of her life. For 15 years Marj served as the

Collection Center Coordinator for all the churches in North Central Washington, playing a critical role and impacting the lives of more than 60,000 children through her service.

Marj's life was one of sustained service and contribution to her family, friends, and to God, through her commitment and service to her church and the Wenatchee Valley—and through the gentle grace with which she lived. She was a founding member of the Eastmont Community Church in 1994, proudly designing and stocking the new kitchen and coordinating all events, including Communion and weddings. For 16 years Marj volunteered daily with the kitchen staff at the Wenatchee Senior Center.

For more than 60 years, Marj was a member of the Chelan-Douglas County Extension of the Washington Homemakers Association, serving as the Editor for her local and state chapters as well as President. The consummate homemaker, she was always learning a new craft, but her creative passions were sewing, crocheting, cooking and especially baking. She loved to read, and dabbled in calligraphy as well as floral arrangement, which she did to help Candy at Kunz Floral when the floral shop shared space with Homer's upholstery business.

Marj was a mainstay at the Farmer's Market for more than 10 years, earning money for her annual visit to see her sister, Hazel in Hawaii. Each week, she baked 2-3 dozen pies and sold her apple brownies along with many other baked goods. In recent years, she continued to test new recipes at her son's workplace by reliably sending baked treats each week.

Marj's service to the community also extended to civic duties as she volunteered on the Election Board for more than 40 years until the ballot process was changed.

Besides her commitment to serving others, Marj will be remembered for her gentle grace, her loyal friendship, generosity to others, her quick wit and sense of humor, and her stubborn determination and resiliency. She lived as an example of kindness, unconditional love, and forgiveness. She will be greatly missed, though her legacy will live on.

Marj is survived by four of her seven children: Tom, Linda Seifert, Jack (Roxie), and Ron; 14 grandchildren, 19 great grandchildren and 4 great-great grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband Homer, her sister Hazel, two brothers, Bob and Eugene, her sons: Bob, Jim and Jerry, and her great-great granddaughter Arielle.

The family would like to thank the caring staff at Regency Rehabilitation Center in Wenatchee, and the exceptional nursing team at Central Washington Hospital for their attentive and tender care of our wonderful Mom, Gram, and dear friend.

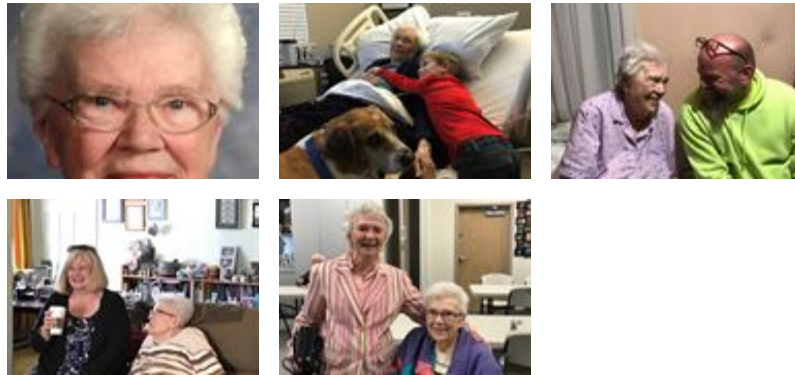
