August 21, 1943 - March 18, 2010

Ronald "Ron" Bonwell, loving husband, father, grandfather, brother and friend passed away at age 66 on Thursday March 18, 2010. He was surrounded by his loving family and friends. Ron was born in Wenatchee, Washington on August 21, 1943 to Lester and Thelma (Riley) Bonwell. He graduated from Wenatchee High School in 1961. He was an original cast member of the Wenatchee Youth Circus for 2 years performing on the tightrope and also as a clown. He went into the US Navy on February 13, 1962, where his career took him to several ports of of call. During one port of call he met and married Pauline Buduan on August 21, 1965 in Kauai, Hawaii. After which they then had three children in three other ports of call. Ron was a torpedo man on the USS Tunny, the USS Puffer, and then the USS Pollock, He also served as Brigg Runner for the Shore Patrol before retiring February 28, 1983. He was very proud of the 21 years that he served in the US Navy.

Ron and his family moved to East Wenatchee in 1983 where he started his second career at the Chelan Regional Jail as a jailer, then later as a Sergeant. He retired from his second career on October 2006. Ron was very active in the American Legion Post 10 in Wenatchee, He served as Adjutant and Finance Officer for several years. He was also a member of Forty and Eight, and was a member of the Eagles Lodge.

Ron enjoyed spending time with his family and friends. He enjoyed camping, fishing and hunting, He especially enjoyed spending time at DAHOBO Inn at Lake Rosevelt, a property developed by him and two friends.

Ron was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his wife Pauline, his three daughters, Laura Bender (Darin), Darla Racus (Troy) and Rhonda Yenney (Chad). Grandchildren, Ashlee, Adam, Austin and Alex Racus, Emma and Maxwell Yenney and Riley Bender. He is also survived by a brother Dan Bonwell (Judy) and their children, Jason, Kirk, Kayla and their families. We can't forget his loving companion, Suzie, his Shitz zhu.

As we neared graduation we were sold on the idea of submarines by a group that was recruiting for the Fleet Ballistic Missile submarine fleet. Ron convinced me that this was the way to go so we both volunteered for submarine duty. We attended sub school New London together. As we neared graduation our orders came to Regulus surface launching guided missile submarines. Ron went to the Tunny, I went to the Growler. I served briefly on the Tunny with Ron before I went to FBM school back at Dam Neck. I don't recall Ron going there with me. Perhaps he converted to torpedoman. I tried to find him a couple of years ago through the on-line phone book. I thought he might be in Wenatchee, but I was unsuccessful. I should have tried again.

So, accept my condolences and these personal memories of our time in the Navy together.

“ What was my big brother to me?

Well he was certainly someone that could irritate me on occasion like most big brothers probably do at times. But what he was all the time was someone that I looked up to, admired, and loved very much.

I was born in March 1956 just 5 months before my brother's 13th birthday. I was told he took me everywhere with him. When I got a little older I remember he took me on a few dates with him. He probably had better luck using a cute little boy as bait and it didn't have anything to do with wanting to be with me. But I want to believe he couldn't stand to leave me behind.

I remember when he was in the Wenatchee youth circus, known then as the "Y" circus as a clown, juggler, and walking the tight rope. He used to take me with him all the time and I remember how much I admired him for what he was doing then.

When I was five years old I didn't understand at the time why he was leaving me but that was when he decided to serve our country by joining the US Navy. At my early age I already couldn't imagine being without him. Little did I know that for the next 21 years I would only see him about once a year when he got leave. I still remember our Mom getting off the phone after talking with him long distance and crying for an hour afterward.

When I was nine we went to Hawaii where I found out he was getting married. I now had a sister as well as a brother who to this day I think very much of. In addition to this they had three girls with the oldest being born when I was just 10. I love them all.

I remember how proud I was that my brother was on a submarine and I used to brag to all my friends about him. I could never wait until the next visit.

In 1983 I remember how happy I was. I was attending my brother's Navy retirement ceremony. He was now coming home for good. Ron, Paula and the girls moved only a few blocks from us. We finally could do all the things together I had dreamed about for so long.

I almost had him working as a Carbon Setter at Alcoa after he got out of the service. Something he wasn't overly excited about doing

at 39 but never the less he had an appointment to get his physical when the Chelan County regional Jail called him to work and bailed him out of setting carbons like his Dad and I.

We did everything together after that right up to the end, hunting for Ducks, Elk, Deer, fishing, camping, and boating and so on. Not just him and I but both of our families including our Mom.

I never like to work on my vehicles and didn't want to because it gave me an excuse to go to his place so he could help me and I could spend time with him.

I have always been the little brother. When I was 20 and he was 33 he said wait until you are in your thirties then you might know something. Well that never happened because when I was in my thirties I needed to be in my forties. You get the idea, because even now that I am 54 I was still the little brother. But I was good with it. I did get even once in awhile when people actually would ask him if he was my Dad.

For the 21 years while he was in the US Navy I was sadden for the limited time I was with him. Now I would give anything to just have that.

I will miss the Debates, as his girls put it. Such as Politics, whose gas is it, and where is the creek. If you ever went Elk Hunting with us In Yakima you would know what that means.

My Big brother loved me and I loved him. I will always remember all of our memories together as a little boy and as a man. We were and are a very close family and will continue to be so even without him. As I told my three gown children always cherish your time together because it isn't going to be forever. And if you ever get upset over debates with each other, get over it.
